Day 1 Arbinger Foundations

Ms. Angela Karnes-Padron and Mr. Nathan Shivers

This informational brief discusses improving productive influence through time management and explores how behaviors impact the foundation of influence. Participants additionally examine skills of locating collusions and assessing costs and compare and contrast self-centered activities with collaborative activities.

Planning Ahead for Just in Time Solutions: Applications of Additive Manufacturing in the Forward Combat Environment

This informational brief identifies components of a 3D printer and polymers associated with Fused Deposition Modeling and Additive Manufacturing. Participants also explore the current usage and future impact and applications of Additive Manufacturing in medical sustainment and warfighting.

COVID-19 Airway Management Isolation Chamber (CAMIC)

MAJ(P) Steven S. Hong, MD

This informational brief reviews current airway management strategies for COVID-19 and discusses the features and advantages of the COVID-19 Airway Management Isolation Chamber (CAMIC). Participants will also review particulate and aerosol testing process and findings of the CAMIC.

Finding a Voice After Laryngectomy

CPT Robert J. Lewis, MD

The informational brief explores challenges patients experience after a laryngectomy and reviews options for speaking after the procedure. Participants also review challenges of why not every laryngectomy patients are candidates for tracheoesophageal prosthesis.

The LRMC Trauma Program: Right-sized, Ready, and Agile

Mary-Anne Purtill, MD

This informational brief discusses Landstuhl Regional Medical Center's role in the chain of medical evacuation and articulates basic capabilities of the Combatant Command Trauma System. Participants also review evacuation challenges faced in the EUCOM Theater and how LRMC's capabilities aligh with the American College of Surgeons (ACS) Level II Trauma status

Surgical Services Service Line (3SL) Business Aspects: Why you need to know and Why! Rachel Baxter, BSN, MHA

This informational brief explains how the Medical Expense and Performance Reporting System data is capture and serves as a data source for decision making. A review of the documentation of staff availability through Defense Medical Human Resource System internet and Medical Group Management Association targets, encounters, and relative value units is also conducted.

A Surgeons Guide to Virtual Health

LTC Matthew Rodgers, MD

This information brief overviews why virtual health is used in Europe and reviews the history of the program in the area of operations. Participants also discuss the spectrum of virtual health and both synchronous and asynchronous platforms.

Post-Extubation Dysphagia in Critical Care Patients

Tracey Fischer, MA, MA, CCC-SLP

This informational brief reviews basic oropharyngeal and laryngeal anatomy and physiology and explores how fiberoptic endoscopic examination of swallow is completed. Participants also review common impairments of swallow function following an intubation and extubation. The brief also explains the impact of COVID-19 pathophysiology on dysphagia in ICU patients following prolonged mechanical ventilation.

Osteoradionecrosis of the Jaw: Brief overview

Maj Christopher Tonn, MD

This informational brief reviews an osteoradionecrosis of the jaw case and explores the pathophysiology and epidemiology of ORN. Participants also discuss classification systems of ORN and review treatment options available.

Army Hearing Program & Audiology: What Primary Care Providers Need to Know

CPT Theresa Galan, Au.D., CC-A, CPS/A

This information brief differentiates between services offered by the Army Hearing Program and the Audiology clinic and reviews clinical decision making and treatment for sudden hearing loss. Participants additionally discuss primary care management evaluation and treatment for benign paroxysmal positional vertigo (BPPV) in primary and emergency care settings.

Communication Across Differences

SFC Settya T. Ngauy

This information brief explores the diversity of communication, cross cultural, cross generational, and cross gender communication characteristics, difficulties and mitigating strategies. An outline of effective communication strategies is also reviewed and discussed in the activity.

Mrs. Rachel H. Baxter is a Registered Nurse with over 28 years of experience in critical care, case management and supervisory nursing within both the civilian and DoD sectors. She holds a Bachelor's degrees in Nursing and Education with Minors in Chemistry and Biology, and Master's degree in Healthcare Administration. Mrs. Baxter has held a wide variety of positions within the healthcare arena, including: Staff Nurse neuro-trauma critical care units in multiple travel assignments across the United States, as well as within Womack Army Medical Center, Ft. Bragg, NC; Nurse Manager at Andrew Rader Clinic, Ft. Myer, VA; Primary Care/Executive Medicine Nurse Case Manager, Brian Allgood Army Community Hospital, Seoul, ROK; as well as Inpatient Nurse Case Manager, Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, DE; and Product Line Manager for the Surgical Services Service Line and Inpatient Service Line, also at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, DE

Tracey Fischer is a medical Speech Language Pathologist at LRMC. She is the sole provider for adults throughout CONUS with disorders such as aphasia, cognitive-executive dysfunction, dysarthria, dysfluency, dysphagia, oro-myofunctional disorders, tracheostomies, voice and/or respiratory dysfunction. Prior to her current assignment she served as a staff SLP at the Voice, Airway and Swallow Clinic for the ENT/Department of Surgery of Ft. Sam Houston/SAMMC, and was formerly a staff SLP at University Hospital in Augusta, GA. She received her Masters of Linguistics as well as Masters of Speech Language Pathology from the University of Ohio. She is currently in the process of becoming a licensed Integrative Breathing Therapist (IBT) as well as obtaining Certification in Orofacial Myology (COM®).

CPT Theresa Galan is an Audiologist and Regional Army Hearing Program Manager for the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center footprint. She graduated from Northern Illinois University in 2008 with a Doctorate of Audiology and has worked in various clinical settings, including both civilian and military.

Presenter Biographies

MAJ(P) Steven S. Hong, MD, serves as the Chief of Head and Neck Oncologic and Reconstructive Surgery at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center and an assistant professor of surgery at USUHS. MAJ Hong is currently serving as the sole fellowship-trained head and neck surgical oncologist in the National Capitol Region and recently awarded the AMSUS physician of the year award for the federal military health system for 2020.

MAJ Hong is a prolific researcher recently leading a team of engineers and physicians to create the CAMIC barrier device to protect our healthcare workers in the fight against the Covid-19 pandemic in record speed, going from concept to prototype within days and FDA emergency use authorization within 6 weeks. In addition, MAJ Hong is also spearheading efforts at USAMRMC as the principal investigator of a multi-million dollar DoD grant to enable safe and effective robotic telesurgery in austere and future operational environments as part of the US Army's Science and Technology Man/Machine Teaming and Medical Robotics. He serves as a Co-PI in multiple other funded medical and technology research projects.

In addition to medical robotics, MAJ Hong also has a special interest in benign and malignant tumors of the head and neck, and the complex reconstruction that comes with their treatment. He also has multiple publications related to fluorescence-guided surgery using molecularlytargeted compounds and analyzing medicolegal outcomes and issues pertaining to head and neck surgery.

CPT Robert Lewis, MD, is currently serving his residency in otolaryngology Head and Neck Surgery at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, MD. He received his Doctorate of Medicine from Marshall University Jan C. Edwards School of Medicine and enjoys spending time with his family, cooking, trail running, and plays the alto saxophone and piano.

SFC Settya T. Ngauy is the Regional Health Command Europe Clinical Operations NCOIC and Virtual Medical Center – Europe NCOIC. He is currently licensed as an EMT-B, trained as an Equal Opportunity Leader and Master Resiliency Trainer

Ms. Angela Karnes-Padron currently works as an Organizational Development / Change Management Consultant and Facilitator that specializes in putting ideas and strategies into action. Additionally she coaches managers and executive leaders to develop skills in team cohesion, conflict resolution, meditation, and quality relationship building.

Registration

How do I register?

Seek Email approval from your supervisor for the days that you want to attend the conference. Registration for intent to attend is completed on the Regional Health Command Europe Conferences webpage.

What is the link for registration?

Do I have to register with DHA too?

Yes, to collect DHA CME you must register on the DHA CEPO site. Please create an account and register for the track and day that you are planning to attend.

Do I need approval from my supervisor/ leadership to attend? *Yes.*

How do I register for multiple tracks?

Email your complete registration to your main track leader and indicate which days of the other track you wish to attend.

I am DOD civilian, may I attend if my supervisor approves?

Yes

Am I eligible to attend if I am not stationed in Germany?

Yes, this medical conference is for any service member/DOD civilian/contractor working within the Military Health System globally. Keep in mind all times listed on the agenda is Central European Summer Time (CEST). Please seek supervisor approval.

CE Credit

Can I get credit for attending one lecture?

No, you must virtually attend the entire day in the same track to receive credit.

How do I get CE credit?

You must complete the post-test for your registered day on the DHA CEPO website. After a score of 80% or higher is achieved you will receive a certificate.

I don't need CE hours and I want to virtually attend one lecture, do I need to register?

Yes, in order to get the virtual log on information you will need to register with the RHCE link above. You do not have to attend the full day, or claim CE hours. We strongly recommend you register on the DHAJ7 CEPO site to claim a Certificate of Attendance.

Can I receive CE hours if the awarded accreditations I need are not listed on DHAJ7 CEPO site?

Yes, a Certificate of Attendance is available listing CE hours for CE applications to accrediting bodies not provided directly by DHA.

Attending the Conference

Can I attend multiple Tracks if my leadership support it? Yes

Which virtual platform will we be using and is there a dial in function?

Cisco Meeting Server (CMS) platform will be utilized during this conference with web browsers as the preferred method. Cisco Jabber application may also be utilized to dial in with the DSN number and meeting ID pin. Cisco Jabber supports both audio and video functions.

Do I need a camera and microphone if I am virtually attending?

Participants do not need a camera or microphone to attend. However a minimum of a microphone is recommended to facilitate discussions on topics.

Can I attend virtually using my personal computer?

Yes, CMS provides a web link accessible from all devices and networks that support a browser. Successful connections have been made via government computers, personal computers, phones, and tablets

Do I need to be on the network using a VPN to attend?

No

Can multiple attendees join the virtual conference using one computer?

Yes, please let your Track leader and conference administration know who will be attending from the same computer, as we need to keep an attendance sheet. The attendees will still need to register with DHAJ7 CEPO for CME credit and with RHCE for notification of their intent to participate in the event.

What if I have technical difficulties?

We recommend testing your computer/location in the weeks before the conference to ensure you know how to enter the virtual space. If you have additional difficulties please contact your local VNC Bridge or the RHCE Conference Support staff to help with technical difficulties.
